

Gorky Park, the Russian rock band, has found much success in the American music industry. They achieved chart success late in 1989 with their songs "Bang" and "Peace in Our Time."

On Tuesday, December 19, 1989, they paid a visit to Andover High School and WBFH.

At WBFH, the band members signed a wall, recorded drop-ins to be played on the air, and were interviewed by Jaymz Mason and Adam Glass. They also presented the staff with a complimentary copy of their new CD recording. Gorky Park is the first Russian rock band to have an American recording contract.

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It Takes 7 Years to "Make It to the Top"


"This is the job I wanted since I was in sixth grade!"—Matt Friedman, Operations Manager

The 23 WBFH staffers who had the chance to tour the WJR/WHYT studios November 28, 1989 were treated to an eyeful of the world of professional broadcasting.



The WBFH Programming Department has been busy this year bringing you over 60 hours of weekly programming. Under the reins of Pat Hynes, program director, WBFH has brought many new shows to the air.

Shows include "Urban Sounds" featuring an hour of rap and soul music; and "Our Generation," featuring songs from the late 70s and early 80s. Programming, with the help of the Computer Department, has catalogued the library of albums

so that listeners will hear a greater variety of music. The other programming improvements include news updates at quarter past each hour, weather forecasts at half past the hour, and more special features.

New Semester Means Better Equipment

No sooner had classes begun for the fall semester when Pete Bowers embarked on a little shopping spree for WBFH. Microphones, a transmitter, and compact disk racks as well as other items were bought.

Mr. Bowers bought the transmitter to replace an archaic RCA version which had long passed its prime and was in danger of "dying." It was a piece of equipment that could no longer be depended upon to broadcast our programming. Although the next transmitter purchased was hoped to be the one capable of operating at 355 watts, the federal government has yet to approve our power increase and, therefore, this version is still a 10 watt model. But there is already a noticeable improvement in our "on-air" sound. In fact, there's less static and it's believed that our signal strength has gained a few more miles.

Microphones play an important part

in the broadcast chain. Without quality microphones the "on-air" sound would be bad. Previously, WBFH had an amalgamation of microphones and the sound quality suffered.

But thanks to Mr. Bowers and his assistant the on-air studio now has three matching studio-quality microphones complete with shock mounts and windscreens. This adds a tremendous boost to the sound quality of WBFH not to mention the aesthetic quality. Now, WBFH can hold its own against the "big boys" of broadcasting with the equipment it has.

Compact discs are now replacing vinyl records at an astounding rate with rumors flying that vinyl will be a thing of the past after 1991. WBFH had welcomed the digital revolution with open arms and bare walls (The Biff had stored its entire CD collection in a shoebox-sized case), but not anymore. The station now has two CD racks that in the near future will house over 400 compact discs.
